Year 7: Lesson 1 Introduction to school library

Instructional Goal: Students will learn to navigate the physical library and access print materials.

Learning Outcomes: On completion of this unit, students will be able to:

- *locate a fiction library book* in an identified reading level and genre
- *locate a non-fiction library book* on an identified subject
- *locate a library book* from the World Languages section
- *borrow and return* library materials
- *verbally describe* one or more library events

Duration: One 55-minute class.

Scheduling: This lesson should take place as early as possible in September.

Delivery of Instruction

Library resources for students

- Areas for group study/socializing, individual study
- Print resources: Books & journals
- Electronic resources: Library website, Encyclopedia Britannica
- Information literacy instruction: Research skills (finding, evaluating, citing resources)

Layout of library (bring students to different areas)

- Cybercafé: comfortable seating, print journals, white board
- Printer & office supplies
- Class hangout: students may use this area when classes are not visiting the library
- Games area
- Reading nook: Please use these spaces appropriately
- Upstairs: Languages (including English language learners)
- ACTIVITY- "Name that flag"
 - Ask for a volunteer, ask what country he comes from, ask if he can identify his country's flag (or any country's flag)
 - Volunteer chooses assistant, who stands next to flag key
 - Volunteer must find his country's flag hanging above bookshelves
 - Assistant checks to see if he is correct
 - Repeat with more volunteers
- Main room:
 - Books color coded for reading/maturity level
 - Graphic novels (new stock coming soon)
 - Difference between fiction/non-fiction
 - Junior & senior non-fiction: Dewey decimal system- classification by subject.
 Each subject has a number and an emoji. Keys posted on shelves. IB & Boring book shelf.

- Junior, senior, and young adult **fiction**. Organized by genre/ alphabetical order of author's last name. Go through the genres.
- Reference materials- dictionary, thesaurus, book of quotes, etc.
- ACTIVITY- "Scavenger hunt" (see below)
 - Form groups of 3
 - Each group is given a list of items to find in library
 - Group assembles items on list & brings them to librarian's desk to be checked
 - Prizes for all students who find all items on the list

Basics

- Library hours- open 8:15-4:15. Senior school students may visit library during morning and lunch break.
- Check-out station at desk. Scan your own barcode (rolodex or student ID card), scan book bar code, stamp due date inside book
- Loan policy (3 books at a time, loan period- 2 weeks, renewals, RETURNS, book reservations)
- Requests for new books/materials

- Marvel movie night

- Will the library be useful to you?
